And who should pay for it? Should content providers contribute to the development of networks in order to preserve the avenues by which their consumers receive their products and services? How could such a mechanism work? - Should Internet service providers be free to prioritise traffic in accordance with content or source, should traffic routing be completely neutral, or is there a way in the middle? | 9.50-12.00 |

As its latest contribution to the promotion of Net Neutrality in Europe, BEREC issued a set of Guidelines on Net Neutrality and Transparency – Best practices and recommended approaches. At the same time, resource allocation, or a prioritisation of data traffic, is already taking place via the various rates being offered to end users. There are also prioritization protocols that the providers implement in order to ensure quality of service at peak times. The questions are:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Does transparency ensure enough protection for the end-users that may be subject to differentiated access to different content online? - Is non-discrimination the answer? - Should there be other specific Net Neutrality obligations imposed on the providers? - What traffic management measures could be considered as appropriate, proportional or sufficient in order to achieve Net Neutrality? - What practices could be defined as reasonable traffic management practices?
